





DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS GIVEN AT CONVENTION

In a ceremony at the awards luncheon, a total of four Distinguished Achievement awards were presented at the convention last year. A number of the awards are given each year to recognize those who have made an "outstanding contribution to the advancement of self-respect, dignity, and a better life for fat people."

An award was presented to actor John Candy, for his performances and the positive images he has often presented, demonstating that an ample figure, coupled with personality, warmth, intelligence, good looks, and even sexuality, are not mutually incompatible qualities. A similar award was given to actress Conchata Ferrell, for the same reasons. (Neither was able to attend the ceremonies.)

An award was given to TV journalist Colin Siedor, of the Gannett Documentary Unit based in Atlanta, Georgia, for his documentary production The Waist Land in America: Our Obsession to be Thin. The documentary, seen on a number of Gannett-affiliated TV broadcast stations around the country, is being considered for possible PBS airing, and is also available for sale or rental as an educational video. Mr. Siedor, in accepting his award by mail, stated his view that NAAFA members, and others in the movement, are the ones who really deserve an award...

Finally, a special Distinguished Achievement award, designated the "Marvin Grosswirth Memorial Award" for excellence in creative writing—in his columns in the NAAFA Newsletter, in health—related special mailings like the Report on Weight—Loss Surgery, in his prolific writing for NAAFA chapter and special interest group publications, in letters and articles published in the popular press, and, finally, in professional journals, was given to Dr. Paul Ernsberger.
